The centenary of the start of World War I takes place in 2014. Many events are to be organised over next four years to the commemorate the war, the lead being taken by the Imperial War Museum.

Locally, there is a project, organised by the Historical Research Group of Sittingbourne, to record the names of all those listed on the first world war memorials of Sittingbourne and eighteen surrounding parishes, including Iwade. The aim is not just to record the names but to reveal who they were, how they served, when and where they sacrificed their lives and where they are buried. Ideally we would like to discover whether they have living relatives, to learn something

20mph Briefing Note

Battling Weeds by Ann

Hopefully by the time you are reading this Iwade will be basking in the sun and cold, windy days will be a distant memory. It is amazing how weed seeds happily lay dormant until the growing conditions are just right, but our vegetables and flowers shiver and sulk, or just plain refuse to grow at all if we put them in too early. A lot of us at the allotments are fighting to get the ground ready to plant, and the battle against the weeds will be lost if they get to spread their seeds. The best advice can give, wherever you garden, is to stop them in their tracks.

Smothering them is the one option I really like. Anything that keeps out the light suitable. Weed suppressant material is designed to let the water through and stop the weeds coming up, but it does need a good covering of something to look good in the garden. Old carpets are often used on allotments, butif left too long hard to lift once it has started to break up. Black polythene is another option which has the benefit of warming up the soil as well, but it doesn't let the water through, which can cause drainage problems, especially with our clay soil. I've been pleased so far with my cardboard I put down last autumn. On top of it I put compost from the bins, as well as some manure. Ideally the beds are covered with layers of cardboard and green waste. Most of the cardboard has now rotted away, but the compost layer is thick enough to stop a lot of weed seeds germinating, and as long as I don't dig and bring them back to the surface, I should have less of a problem.

Weed killer can be very useful if used carefully, but it's hard to find a time that is safe to spray. Drifting weed killer can be a real problem to neighbouring plots at the allotment site as it will kill other people's crops as well as the weeds. If there is a calm spell and you are not totally organic, it is worth using this before getting the ground rotavated. Otherwise the rotavator will chop the roots into little bits, each one able to grow a

new plant in the case of the thistles and some other weeds. Not the type of propagation most of us want.

Canvassing

by Roger Truelove KCC Election candidate. 'Oh to be in England, now that April's there'

When Victorian poet Robert Browning offered his wistful home thoughts from abroad, he did not have in mind spending every day in April canvassing for votes on every English man's doorstep. That, rather strangely, is what I have done for nearly every one of the last 30 years.

Now in the middle of a current campaign, I am writing this most categorically not in the hope of currying support, but to give some insight into what it feels like to be the intrusive supplicant standing at your door.

The first thing to say this year is that it is very cold. I have never known it feel so cold for a spring election. Indeed, at times we have decided not to venture out at all, partly of course, to protect our own health but also in deference to the poor people who we drag, often reluctantly, to the front door.

I have friends who ask "why do you do it?" In fact, there are some party members, in all parties, who will do anything for the cause, except canvass. For some it is too much of a stressful experience. They fear that they may be caught out on some key political point and let the side down.

The truth is that the doorstep exchanges rarely contain much that is truly political. In fact, I honestly believe that when national political figures talk about "the issues on the doorstep" they are usually being a bit creative and selective about what those issues are.

Rather than talk about the economy, or the health service, or foreign policy, it is much more likely that the conversations on the doorstep are about the immediate road surface, litter collection or a children's play area.

Of course, there is also a fear of being rudely rejected, but that happens very rarely. It isn't very English to be rude. Of course, if you can't accept somebody telling you they won't vote for you, then you had better not start canvassing. By any analysis, that has to happen. Even in the recent Falklands citizenship vote, there wasn't a 100% vote in one direction. What is a little more depressing is when voters (or rather non-voters) reject the whole political process. "You're all the same, I'm not voting" they say. Sadly this group grows year by year. This is not the place to discuss the reasons why.

Now, I still have not said why we do it. We don't really expect to convert people do we? No, we don't. However, all the evidence suggest that if we don't bother to call on people, then a fairly substantial number of those who might support a particular party, decline to bother too. They stay at home on Election Day.

As I write this, I am exactly half way through the current campaign. There is a long way to go. What sustains our willingness to carry on canvassing day after day until the election is over? I am sure this may seem pathetic to some readers, but to the political activist, Election Day and the counting of the votes is a little akin to being in the Cup Final of a major sport, say football or cricket. The emotions after the event are very similar too, depending of course on the result.

In fact, if the weather has improved by then, I'm pretty sure that once the counting is over I will seek to restore emotional sanity, and go off to Canterbury to watch some cricket.

An Interview with Stephen Plumb

The youth of our community is very important to all of us, but 'youth' is a very wide term. We asked budding young jounalist Sam to interview key member of the community, Stephen Plumb.

What is your position? I live in Iwade and am employed by the Diocese of Canterbury as a Missioner to north Sittingbourne with focus in Iwade.

What is your involvement in the village? I am a Parish Councillor for Iwade, currently the Chair. As part of the community aspect of my role and in conjunction with Iwade Community Primary School, I listen to the children read each week, take assemblies and I am also a school Governor. I have taken responsibility for the Sunday morning worship at All Saint's Church since Christmas 2012

Do you enjoy your job? Most of the time yes, it is very varied and when there are positive outcomes for people or situations it is very fulfilling.

What activities do you know are available for youth in the village and what is your opinion on them? A major attraction to live in Iwade was the number of community groups and organisations for people of all ages. When you ask about youth, it depends what specific age category you are referring to. Secondary School age young people are under served in Iwade. There was a youth club running in the village hall until guite recently. There are the uniformed organisations which do a great job and have a strong membership, but have little appeal to the older teenager. The primary/junior age are much better provided for, again with uniformed organisations, the Herons FC, after school clubs at school, and I with others run Kingsguad (Christian Childrens club) every Tuesday.

If you do not think there is enough, what do you think should be done? The Parish Council is currently asking the residents of Iwade to contribute their ideas to help draw up a ten point plan to improve and enhance life in the village. Questionnaires were delivered to every home in Iwade and the finalised plan will be endorsed by Swale Borough Council under their 'Localism Live' program. The opinions and suggestions of young people would be very welcome.

There has, in the past, been the suggestion of young people setting up a 'Youth Council' which is made up of young people from the village to promote ideas relevant to young people. However no young people came forward to run with the idea. But the idea has been raised again this week and it would be great for young people and the whole community if such a council could be set up.

Iwade Parish Council Notes taken from the meeting of 13th March 2013

Matters Arising from the Minutes- New Housing Proposals for the SE Sector of the Village – The Chairman referred to the Local Development Framework meeting at Swale Borough in February, when Cllr. Lewin stated that although a lot of work had been done looking at housing figures, local Councils were being asked to look at these again by central Government. Cllr. Lewin said that the Borough Council would prefer to stay with the figure in the original 'Bearing Fruits' document, although it would be guite hard for the local Planning Officers to implement. Reasons were put forward by the Planners as to rising figures; but the majority of Councillors in the Committee were very keen to stay with the original figure of about 11,000 homes. The document now goes before the Planning Inspector and is expected to be rejected, but it does feel that all the Councillors were very supportive to the view that Iwade has had enough housing.

An area of land to the SE of the village has been earmarked for 400 homes. A large number of lwade residents voiced their disappointment with this proposal, which they totally oppose. At the moment there does not seem to be any willingness by the Borough Council to grant permission for extra housing in Iwade, apart from that already aiven.

20 m.p.h. Speed Limit in Iwade – Cllr. Hunt's survey has shown that residents would prefer this speed limit, although some questions were raised and the comment made that in most of the streets in the new sections of the village you cannot go over 20 m.p.h. It would appear that Grovehurst Road and School Lane are the main areas of concern. Cllr. Whiting commented that whilst there was still a case for making a 20 m.p.h. zone; there would need to be some traffic calming installed in these two roads. Kent County Council will not action this at the moment; at present they have 80 schemes county wide and are waiting to see how these are performing. He suggested conducting a wider survey. KCC would want to do a wide consultation, but he still thinks it will be worthwhile looking at this.

Secondary School Transport – Bullying Issues - Cllr. Gale has arranged a meeting with the Bus Company, a representative from Kent Police, County Cllr. Whiting and the Clerk to look at this issue. He will report back at the April meeting.

Village Centre – Members were pleased to see that Londis have taken over the old Budgens unit and the shop is now up and running. Clerk to contact Village Centre Management to ascertain who controls the car park as complaints have been received about parking issues. A Parishioner mentioned that there will be new signs and a disabled parking bay for the village centre.

School Lane Playing Field and Handyman Duties – Swale Borough Council, is seeking a guotation from Wicksteed for the removal and installation of the play equipment in another part of the Borough. The equipment is still insured and regularly inspected by the Handyman. It was agreed to utilise the Handyman in other areas of the village until the future management of the playing field is determined.

County Cllr. Willicombe mentioned that this will be the last time he will be attending a meeting before the May elections and that he has really enjoyed working with this Parish Council; Cllr. Whiting made the same comment. The Chairman thanked both Members for their help over the past years.

County Cllr. Whiting has been trying to arrange a meeting with Persimmon. He is also in the process of arranging a visit to Aylesford Depot. He thought it was good news concerning the Local Development Forum and housing. He is trying to get Eric Pickles, M.P. (the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government) to come and look at Iwade.

Community Warden (Nick Mayatt)/PCS0 – Nick's report has been circulated to Members and its contents were noted. He added that dog fouling is still a problem and there are still issues with parking.

Matthew Link introduced himself as the village's new PCSO (he has taken over from Aaron); he has been doing this work for six years and has worked with County Cllrs. Whiting and Willicombe. He has already dealt with some issues within the village: school parking, mud and HGV problems in School Lane. He has also been looking into plant pot thefts. He can be contacted through 101; but if it's an emergency residents should ring 999.

Iwade Localism Project (Swale Borough Council)- 10 Point Plan – Distribution agreed, letter printed and awaiting collection bMembers.

The Barn – The Chairman advised that the meeting with Swale Borough Council to discuss the Church/Parish Council taking over the Barn had been very positive. Swale plan to utilise the building for staff use and storing tools for the new Graveyard, but it is hoped it can instead be used as a small meeting room for the Church and community groups. It has electricity and water laid on, but Swale is not sure about drainage. The Council will need an alternative facility for their staff and equipment and there is the possibility of sufficient ground within Church land to accommodation this. It was also suggested that Swale set up a meeting for those present to look inside the Barn.

New Village Hall- Cllr. Hunt advised that Persimmon has got back to him and it is not possible to have the new Village Hall on School Lane Playing Field; basically they have run out of time because of the S.106 Agreement on the Sports Pavilion. He suggested the piece of land next to the Medical Centre and they have agreed this is something they could consider. County Cllr. Whiting will try and raise this with Persimmon.
