MEDWAY MODEL FLYING CLUB

The Club's name is Medway Model Flying Club (MMFC), perhaps a little misleading as for all of its 50 years the club has flown at Iwade! It's named MMFC as the founder members all came from Gillingham or Chatham but could not find a suitable area to start a club there and Medway Council had banned all model flying in the local parks. After speaking to a friendly farmer Medway MMFC came to Iwade in 1974, and has been flying at Iwade ever since

We are currently situated approximately one mile from the centre of Iwade. We started flying in a field owned then by a local Land owner Ms June Thomas. Her Field was just off of Raspberry Hill. We had regular meetings there until we moved to our present site at Orchard Farm off School lane near its junction with Stickfast Lane.

We fly all types of models from Control line, Radio
Control Drones or Quad-Copters too and planes of all
descriptions - apart from Turbine models.
The club became affiliated with the British Model Flying
Association (BMFA), our national body around 1999.
They look after our interests nationally and
communicate with the Civil Aviation Authority when
needed and arrange our insurance and events

started in 2022 to mark the BMFA's Centenary and has now become an annual event. Due to weather conditions the previous year's record of 3,109 model at 263 clubs was not beaten but watch out for next year's attempt.

Our club has spaces for new members including youngsters of all ages, from 10 to 100. We offer, free to members, one-to-one training and advice on appropriate choice of model and radio equipment to get started, and we operate a dual control system for novice pilots.

During the summer months the club organises one or two Swap Meets where you can pick up a bargain or sell your unwanted modelling related goods (see picture). A small charge is made for a pitch that goes into our charity fund. Any profits from our activities have been given to a charity and since we started the charity chosen has been the Kent, Surrey and Sussex Air Ambulance (KSSAA) and over the years the club has raised donations to the KSSAA in excess of £20,000.

During the winter months we arrange indoor flying at the Medway Park Sports and Leisure Centre in Gillingham where we have raffles to help cover the cost of the hall and any again all profits go to the KSSAA. We would love to be nearer but there are no indoor

facilities in the area. We are a friendly club and welcome anyone interested in the hobby to

IWADE INSPIRATION: ANIMATED ACTIVITY

As promised in my last month's column, I want to spend just a little time discussing communication with your local GP surgery and Health Centre. I'm old enough to remember the days when a call to your local surgery meant a visit from your doctor within days if not hours and his or her cheerful face would peer around your bedroom door with good medical advice and prescriptions for your chemist. No, it's not an episode of Call The Midwife; this really used to happen. How times have changed! If you want to make an appointment now, as you know, you will need to grapple with the ANIMA system. It's new and it can be confusing but change needs patience and a bit of persistence.

One of the Patient's Group I chair wrote to me of their experience of Anima which was, on the whole, positive. It did take two attempts, the

first saying: "system at capacity, please try again at 2.30" but once the request was accepted there was a call within 10 minutes and an appointment notified by text within 15. The actual GP appointment was prompt and the doctor was good-humoured, attentive, understanding and thorough although she did have a rather strong accent. Many of us on the PPG are agreed that Iwade surgery like so many parts of the NHS is struggling with underfunding, lack of resources and pressures on time and talent. It leaves us all feeling a bit grumpy and impatient but deep down we know we have to try and make it work.

But what to do if you can't get online or get to grips with Anima? Iwade practice assure me that the young and the elderly are prioritised and therefore, it is possible to bypass Anima and make an appointment direct. Please persist with reception and explain politely that you are unable to use the system. I will be asking the Iwade Practice for a more widely publicised and thorough explanation of how Anima works. WATCH THIS SPACE!

Incidentally, I got my first post in the Pharmacy PPG metal box. It was a well worded letter with many positive comments about the Iwade practice and its staff and appreciation of their kindness and courtesy. The letter was anonymous and contained no contact details leaving me unable to follow it up directly so a THANK YOU in this column must suffice. I will pass on the contents to the practice and also raise the "things which could be improved" section of the letter.


SPEEDWAY'S 2024 START

Food for Thought: "Who do you say I am?

"Christ is risen. He is risen indeed! Alleluia!" Such are the words that will ring out every Sunday morning now across the world in this Easter season throughout this month of April. For like Christmas, Easter is not just a day. It is a period when Christians acknowledge the impact of the risen Jesus, not just transforming the lives of his followers then but transforming the world ever since.

This same Jesus had been executed and buried just a few days before. Yet there he stood amongst his friends unmistakably alive, having overcome death. Even the worst thing that anyone could do to another to silence them, by putting them to death, could not prevail. Is this why in recent times the Russian opposition figure Alexei Navalny, a professed Christian, was able to face into his ordeal and eventual death at the hands of Putin's brutal regime? Even death could not hold him.

Christians speak of this as being the greatest day in history. Even as I write these words, I'm sure that there will be some thinking, "really?" Yes, really. For it is not just Christians who

NEWS FROM CITIZENS ADVICE SWALE - MARCH 2024

We're experiencing a busy winter at Citizens Advice Swale, including our energy advice team, which was formed in response to the national cost website. We've ensured of living crisis.

Fortunately, with the help of funding from a number of local and national bodies, we've been able to direct energy advice and financial assistance to the most vulnerable in our community as well as to those who've needed extra support in these challenging times.

Since our energy project began, the team has operated through a number of channels, providing face-to-face energy and general advice in local foodbank venues while ensuring we reach out to the most isolated clients by telephone and email. The aim of the project hasn't simply been to help clients access emergency energy funding but to provide a holistic advice service to address clients' specific issues. As important as it is to deliver this short-term assistance, we aim to empower clients to tackle the root of their problems so they're better able to manage going forward.

Although each client has been affected in different ways depending on their individual circumstances, we've noticed several recurring themes from those we've helped.

Single parents with young children have been some of the most affected by the cost of living crisis and they've struggled to afford the high energy costs alongside the rising prices of food, school supplies and other essentials. Many of these parents have found themselves asking for food and fuel vouchers for the first time in their lives and so it's been pivotal for us to assist these clients to help them find the necessary providers of support within the community.

The cost of living crisis hasn't discriminated in terms of age however, with several middle-age and pension age clients struggling to afford expensive energy payments. Many clients in this age bracket have been unaware of the energy support available, with much of it being

advertised on the internet or gov.uk that such clients are able

to navigate the myriad of energy related information that is communicated over the internet and that they're receiving all the support they're entitled to.

Many of the clients we've helped also suffer from multiple health conditions. When providing energy support to these clients we've discovered that many of these clients haven't been accessing the necessary benefits or housing according to their health needs. Our holistic approach to advice has been especially crucial here as we have been able to help the client with several types of issues at first contact and ensure they're then able to receive help from specialists, e.g. debt and benefits, in our wider local team.

Throughout this project we've found that the majority of our clients requiring energy support are those that pay using Prepayment Meters (PPMs), however many billed customers have also struggled to maintain payments. Regardless of payment type, we've ensured that all clients are receiving any financial assistance that they qualify for in addition to providing practical energy advice to help maximise their income.
