# **PASTORAL LETTER**

What is greatness?

mbedded in the slogan used by the US President-elect Lis the word "great". Yet what do he & others around him mean by this? Is this for the many or the few? We often now see the acronym GOAT (Greatest Of All Time) applied to the achievements of significant sportsmen in their different sports. So, in football there are debates about whether it is Lionel Messi or Christiano Ronaldo, but what about Pele and Maradona? Who gets to decide? Not the players themselves. Yet the boxer Cassius Clay (before he became Muhammad Ali) famously stated "I am the Greatest" as part of putting down his opponent Sonny Liston before their fight, although he did go on make his point by winning the fight. Yet it seems that self-proclaimed "greatness" can be about expressing a sense of self-serving superiority, arrogance with power and authority over others, rather than for others. Sadly, this can lead to violent conflict and war, as either an individual or system seeks to impose their will on and lord it over others. Is that really what "greatness" is all about, the subjugation of others? We see this being played out currently in different parts of the world as certain leaders vie for power with people just trying to live their lives, but paying the price, with their lives, homes and communities being devastated.

So, back to the question of who decides who is great or the greatest?

Jesus said, "whoever wants to become great, is to first serve others" Mark 11.43-44 in response to the desire for assumed power and significance on the part of two of his disciples James & John. He told them, in no uncertain terms, how even he "did not come to be served but to serve". Such thinking is challenging. It was then and remains so today. For our assumptions about greatness are turned on their head. It is not about power and might, but about humility and service. On Remembrance Day we remembered those who gave their lives in service for a "land fit for heroes". Surely the claim to greatness of any land or society is measured by how the least are looked after. For Jesus said "whatever you do for the least, you did for me" Matthew 25.40. What better way for us today to continue to honour the sacrifice of those who gave their lives in war, than in serving others especially the more vulnerable in our midst. For in so doing, it is Jesus we are serving.
