Son's of Iwade in World War 1

Due to pressure of space in the December issue the remaining Iwadians remembered on the plaque in the church have been carried over to 2015.

This month we look at two Williams - William Kingsnorth, and William Barnes.

William Thurston Kingsnorth, was born in early 1883 and baptised at All Saints Church on 4th March that year. William was the seventh child of Thomas and Martha Kingsnorth who lived at Homersham Place, Iwade.

William signed up with the 32Bn, Royal Fusiliers and was killed in action on the 22nd September 1917 in The Battle of the Menin Road Ridge, which was a part of what was to become known as the Third



Battle of Ypres. The Battle of the Menin Road Ridge started in heavy mist at 5:40 am on 20th September when 65,000 troops advanced along an 8-mile front, and William was among the 20,255 casualties, of which 3148 were killed in securing the objective.

The photo shows the British Army at the Battle of the Menin Road Ridge taken the day before William was killed. (© IWM (Q 7808)) William is commemorated at Tyne Cot Cemetery, about 5miles north east of Ypres. Tyne Cot is the largest Commonwealth War Grave in the world in terms of burials.

William John Barnes, was born in 1891 to his parents William and Margaret of 6 The Street, Iwade. William enlisted with 3/1st East Kent Yeomanry, probably in Canterbury, before that regiment was disbanded, and the troops dispersed variously. William transferred to 10th Bn The Buffs East Kent Regiment where he mustered with his colleagues in Sollum, Egypt, a theatre of the First World War that is often forgotten.

The Buffs formed part of the 74th (Yeomanry) Division under Sir Edmund Allenby, and were engaged in the Third Battle of Gaza (a name that will be very familiar to many of us still!), and in particular the Capture of Beersheba (a town about 45 miles south west of Jerusalem in modern day Israel) on 31st October 1917. The offensive was successful, but sadly William was one of 171 fatalities that day. He is commemorated at Beersheba Commonwealth War Cemetery. The following extract from the East Kent Gazette of 24th November 1917 (supplied by Angela Self via Graeme Horner, for which grateful thanks) gives a more personal recollection of William:- Continued on page 3...

"Mr and Mrs William Barnes of Iwade, have received the sad news of the death of their fourth son, Private William Barnes, who fell in action on October 31st. in the campaign in Palestine. William Barnes was 26 years of age and a promising lad and much respected in the neighbourhood, where his cheery face will be missed. For some years he has been a chorister and sidesman in All Saints Church, Iwade, and was always very enthusiastic in fulfilling his duties in that direction. He was keenly interested in football and previous to the war was a member of the Wednesday Club. In the spring of 1915, Pte Barnes volunteered his services for his country and joined the East Kent Yeomanry ... in April 1916 he left with the British Expeditionary Force for Egypt and was transferred to

Iwade Patient Participation Group on behalf of Iwade Health Centre

The holiday period seems so long ago, but for the health sector, this winter period is a very difficult one as I'm sure you've seen on the news. We all have our part to play in keeping our services running to their best ability and it's easier to help than you think. Our automatic reaction when we're poorly is to call for a GP appointment, but is that the right course of action? Would you consider other options? This can really help free up GP appointments for those who absolutely need one.

Another way we can all help is to not miss our appointments. The 'Did Not Attend' for IHC are awful (see Ed's note below) To help ameliorate this problem we have introduced a text messaging service, so when you book an appointment, you will receive a text the day before the appointment as a reminder. This will only work if IHC has your most up to date mobile number though, so please ensure they have this.

If you need to save time ordering repeat prescriptions or booking a routine appointment in advance, why not try the online system? It requires a quick visit to reception to register and receive a password but then it's accessible for you at any time.

Great news on the staffing front! In addition to Dr Poplett and Dr Kotla as permanent GPs, we will be welcoming Dr Dada on a permanent, part-time basis in February. She will be working Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays and I'm sure will be a welcome addition to the IHC clinical team.

With the changes made to IHC over the past year, we hope the majority of patients now have a positive experience. If you have a spare 2 minutes, your feedback (especially positive) would be welcomed at www.nhs.uk. In the middle section you can choose GPs and input your postcode. Find IHC and click on Rate It Yourself. Please only leave honest feedback.

Finally, a reminder to those who are eligible for the flu vaccine; you have until the end of March to book yourself in and have this done. We all know how nasty the flu bug can be, so if it's available to you, we encourage you to have it.

Our next meeting is Monday 9th February at 7pm and we'd love to see you there.

MINUTES OF THE IWADE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING Held on Wednesday 12th November, 2014

Prior to the meeting a representative from 4Evergreen Technologies Ltd addressed those present and advised that the company is proposing to build the "Garden of England Energy Project" at Kemsley Park (formerly Ridham Dock). The site is just off Barge Way to the south of Morrison's distribution centre. It will be the first of the company's "Bio-Parks" and will deliver locally sustainable community energy. It is a small scale energy generating facility which converts high organic content waste materials – essentially things like scraps of paper, card and plastic that cannot be economically recycled – into energy named 'Syngas'; the whole process is 'sealed' with low emissions. The facility is self-sufficient and will generate 10.4 Megawatts (MW) of electricity; 2.2 MW will be used to run the operations on site and 8.2 MW will be exported to the National Grid. There will be approximately ten HGV deliveries of fuel per day – 20 HGV movements per day. The company is looking to submit a planning application by the end of the month, hoping that it will be determined during the first part of next year.

A member of the Kemsley Field's Residents Association was present and as they had concerns asked if a presentation could be given to inform householders, which was agreed. The Chair of the Parish Council referred to the meeting at Knauf this morning, and at which the representative was present, where a clear indication was given of traffic problems on the A249.

County and Borough Councillors – County Cllr. Truelove referred to the School Planning application, which goes before KCC's Planning Committee next Wednesday; he has put down to speak and will put forward the Parish Council's comments. He believes that if the intake is from the village people should walk to school; he also believes the school should make the travel plan work. He commented that KCC has become a fully commissioned authority and that every single service is

provided by a third party. The yellow lines planned for Sheerstone have been organised by him and he has also arranged for a litter bin to be installed in Sheerstone. County Cllr. Burgess also mentioned KCC outsourcing services. He raised his concerns about the changes to the Community Warden Scheme and that Iwade could lose Nick Mayatt.

Borough Cllr. Stokes has received complaints from residents that they are not happy because the pavements and roads are not finished, also there are problems with the drains; as a result of this he had a meeting with Persimmon but was not very happy with this. He also received a complaint regarding bushes in the road which he has dealt with and has spoken to a resident regarding road signs on the new Wards estate. He noted that the Barn was still not finished; the Chair thought the work would be completed during December.

Community Warden (Nick Mayatt)/PCSO - The PCSO mentioned the three burglaries in the Village and the theft of fog lights; 'Operation Castle' is running at the present time in connection with burglaries; he added that in Iwade there is a one in one thousand chance of burglary; in the rest of Swale it is one in one hundred. He referred to Police posts on 'Twitter' and the Chair is happy to post anything from the Police 'Twitter' on to Iwade Does Facebook.

The Community Warden, Nick Mayatt raised the issue of fly tipping in Ferry Road; two sets of evidence have been found. He will also get some fly posters removed.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

1. Twinning – Cllr. Rook to ask the organiser to come to the next meeting and give a talk on the orphanage and village in Malawi.

things that Countrystyle can do to improve their systems; the company is aware of these but are not being proactive. The Environment Agency is bringing out more stringent regulations next year. Agreed to take this item off the Agenda until further notice.

3. Emergency Plan – Cllr. Rook advised that sadly no volunteers have come forward; therefore the plan has to be dropped.

4. Electric Shocks, Sheppey Way – Clerk chasing National Grid. Clerk to forward Health and Safety booklet supplied by U.K. Power Networks to Cllr. Wastall.

Village Hall Representative

Proposed by Cllr. Hunt and seconded by Cllr. Hyde, all agreed, Cllr. Gale appointed as the new representative on the Village Hall Committee; Clerk to advise the Hall's Chairman and ask that Cllr. Gale be sent the Agenda for the next Committee meeting and any supporting paperwork.
