
Q. I am a solo traveller and nervous about being on my own.

NEWS FROM CITIZENS ADVICE SWALE - OUR IMPACT IN 2024/25

Our data is in for 2024/25 and we're proud to share the impact we've had on our clients across Swale.

We helped 2,047 people. 11% were disabled and 56% had a longterm health condition. We helped with 2,213 debt issues, 1,192 housing issues and 3,715 benefits and Universal Credit issues. In addition to this, we supported people with a further 8,689 problems including energy, relationship, employment and consumer issues. We're seeing an increase every year on the number of issues a client comes to us with, and more complicated cases, due to the continued effect of the cost of living.

Our specialist money advisers wrote off £298,115 debts, and our clients gained income of £1,844,797 with our help.In 2024/5 every £1 invested into Citizens Advice Swale was worth £14.66 in public value. Our local services saved the NHS £179,183 by reducing use. We saved the Department for Work and Pensions £456,660 by keeping people in work. PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends


I have ,always enjoyed being out in the natural world, surrounded by the sights, sounds and smells of creation (I am thinking of bluebell woods rather than slurry, I have to say!). I have vivid memories of my teacher Mr Smith at Newington School, who would look out of the window and say, 'It's a lovely day! Get your coats; we're going for a walk.' How times have changed; there's no way that could happen in schools now! We would walk around lanes and footpaths around Newington, and Mr Smith – who I found out only a few years ago was a churchwarden at Upchurch – would point out the wildflowers in the hedgerows and teach us their names. I remember the occasion a slow worm ambled across the path down at the watercress beds, seeing water boatmen, just under the surface of the water, and pond skaters, doing as their name suggests. Red and white campion, lords and ladies, vetch... he was a knowledgeable man who helped us to notice the beauty around us. It's a habit that has stayed with me. But one thing I am not good at is

identifying bird song. I love to hear the glorious cacophony around me, but beyond the obvious – sparrow, robin, cuckoo, for example – I don't know what I'm hearing. Then I discovered a brilliant app, Merlin (and it's free to download!). You simply click, and it identifies the song of the birds in the vicinity. I've become slightly addicted, and love the different song heard at different times of the day and in different locations; my back garden, the woods at Monkey creation, but also, live in the world as Island, by the dock at Lower Halstow, in Stockbury churchyard, to name but a few. And as well as informing me, I feel it's opening my ears and my

understanding of what's around me. If I know I'm hearing a blackcap, I stand some chance of seeing it. And I can't help but draw parallels with my broader perception of the world, both on the physical and spiritual level. Noticing. It's easy to go around blinkered by our own concerns, anxieties and lists of things to do. Not to be aware of the people around us, of the beauties as well as suffering right under our noses. Jesus was a great noticer; he knew when a woman seeking healing had touched his cloak in the busy throng around him (Mark 5), he noticed Zaccheus up in a tree (Luke 19), he noticed the lame man by the pool at Bethesda (John 5). And as he noticed, he loved and brought healing and acceptance to these people who would have been ignored by most of those around them. There's a lesson for us! And informed noticing, as I have found with Merlin, brings greater appreciation of and ability to engage with, my surround-ings. If we tune in prayerfully with what is around us, it's almost like having an app which helps us notice! Looking at the world, as Teresa of Avila famously prayed, with Christ's eyes.

"Christ has no body now on earth but yours, no hands but yours, no feet but yours, Yours are the eyes through which to look out Christ's compassion to the world. Yours are the feet with which he is to go about doing good; Yours are the hands with which he is to bless men now."

So, enjoy the blessings and beauties of those who notice, care and are active. Wouldn't that make our world a better place? Every blessing, Amanda
