She was also able to watch some of the old film footage, and potentially even spot herself.

We are very lucky to have two women from the greatest generation still living in the village just a stone's throw from each other. We thank them for the service at the time of our greatest need."

VICTORY IN IWADE

That a great sight to see so many Iwade residents gathered around The Barn last month singing I Vow to Thee My Country whilst consuming copious amounts of Fish and Chips and drinks and then later around the park Beacon as it burned brightly to remind us of the 80th Anniversary of VE Day. It wasn't just the vital importance and gravitas of the occasion, reminding us of the joy and relief felt by a grateful nation at the end of World War Two, but simply the fact of seeing young and old gathered together, enjoying one another's company, chatting, sipping their drinks and recognising how much we value one another. Our local schools in this part of Swale have rightly focussed on what took place across Europe eighty plus years ago and our children have learned together about the significance of war and the precious nature of peace. I have had the privilege of sharing in some of the school celebrations with parents, pupils and teachers and it has been deeply inspiring to see how our youngsters have taken the lessons to heart.

On a couple of occasions, we have sung together a new song by Matthew Crossey and Tom Kirkham, composed especially for this 80th Anniversary: Sing For The King. One of the lines touched me deeply. Raise your voices high, High up to the sky, And know that they'll always be more that ties us than sets us apart.

Consciously or unconsciously, the residents of Iwade were living out that sentiment as they met and celebrated on 8th and 10th May. They do it on many other occasions too in and around our village.

Let's be honest now; our world is in a bit of a mess with hatred, racist activity, wars and conflicts in many places, including Gaza and Ukraine. We cannot turn a blind eye to these things but we can continue to stir up the kind of community activity that draws us towards each other to talk, to listen and to celebrate our lives and histories. Somebody once said: a world coming apart needs a people coming together. Or to use Matthew and Tom's words know that they'll always be more that ties us than sets us apart.

We've shared our national VE Day anniversary celebration this year. Let's actively look for every opportunity to celebrate that which ties us together. God bless you!

IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM THE IWADE PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP

In case you were wondering, your local PPG is still going strong and delighted to report that matters are improving at the Health Centre on Monins Road. Thank you to those who have sent in suggestions and words of thanks and encouragement.

I am grateful to Sharon on Reception for drawing my attention to an important process for contacting your doctor. **Please take note**;

If you have the blue NHS App (easily downloadable free from the Apple or Android store) then log in and go to the **Home page**, scroll down to **Messages** and select View your messages. Scroll down to select the last of your three inboxes headed **GP Surgery Messaging**. Select this and then select **Send a Message**. You will then be asked **Do You Need Advice**? Select **No, my Message is Not Urgent** and then **Continue**. You will then see the name of your GP and you can select them for a message. Up to 64 characters (about 10 words) for the subject and up to 450 characters (about 75 words) for the message. You can ask your doctor anything and even request prescription medicines. **The one thing you may not do is request an appointment**. This must still be done via Anima or directly at the practice Reception.

The NHS app is very useful if you are able to use it and **remember**, please let us know your questions, comments and encouragements via the **Suggestion Box** in the Health Centre and in the Iwade Pharmacy. I am also happy for you to contact me direct via Text, WhatsApp or Facebook Message on **07710 353461**. Thank you.

- Is there a break clause allowing any fixed term to be ended early, if needed? •
- Does the landlord need a guarantor?
- Is there a tenancy deposit, how much is it, and how will it be protected?

Additionally the residents of Iwade could set up a Friends group to manage the park and they would be eligible for funding. The Clerk will add this to the next agenda.

meeting regarding reviewing the positioning of cameras, which unfortunately has not happened yet but he will look into this. He also informed the council that during periods of absence Police Officers have authorisation to help cover other areas. PC Clemens reported on the following local issues:

• It has been drawn to my attention that vehicles are once again preventing the correct flow of traffic through School Lane at School pickup/drop-off times and are parking along the yellow zig-zag lines. This is not only dangerous but also illegal. Moving forward I will be performing spot-checks during these times providing education to road users and to prevent nuisance behaviour.

• A group of youths were spotted playing near the train tracks of the Swale railway station underneath the old Sheppey Crossing. I am told that they were playing with the signal box. Enquiries are ongoing with the British Transport Police to identify those involved.

• Only one instance of a nuisance vehicle has been reported this month. I am happy to see that this trend continues and am hopeful that even during the warmer months this will continue.

• A resident contacted the Parish Council regarding issues of antiscocal behaviour relating to a Public Right of Way in Springvale. PC Jez Chittim previously looked into the closure of the alleyway and installing a temporary CCTV camera. PC Clemens will look into this again and advised incidents should be reported to Kent Police.
