Welcome and Apologies

The Chair formally welcomed everyone to the meeting. Apologies received and accepted from Parish Cllr. Hyde, and Borough Cllr. Woodford, and PCSO Linge.

Declarations of Interest and Dispensations

None.

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

Proposed by Cllr. Lancashire and seconded by Cllr. Langham, the Minutes of the Parish meeting held on the 9 February 2022 were agreed and signed by the Chair as a true record.

Visitors/Public Time

1. Visitors

A resident attended to raise their concerns regarding the Village Hall.

2. County and Borough Councillors Borough Cllr. Baldock:

a. Kent County Council has released a new budget, which includes details of funding cuts for bus services, but fortunately Iwade bus services are currently not affected.

b. Cllr. Baldock has asked for extra Community Wardens which he is hopeful will happen in the coming year. **c.** The Highways maintenance budget has increased but this is below the budget that is needed to keep County roads up to a good standard. He also advised that the County has several concrete roads which are coming up to 50/60 years old which have been patched up but currently there is no funding to replace them.

d. Iwade council could nominate potential quiet lanes, which would require less maintenance and make the road safer for cyclists, pedestrians, and horse riders.

e. He is currently putting forward a motion for assisted travel to grammar schools. Currently when a child is allocated a grammar school their assisted travel is allocated to the nearest appropriate school, which may be a non-grammar school. He is trying to change this so that assisted travel is allocated to the nearest grammar school.

f. Cllr Baldock informed the council that the Western Area Committee met and has advised that they would like to award some money to the Iwade Barn.

g. Swale Borough Council are responsible for closed church yards which have a back log of 1.25 million pounds of work which needs to be done. The Western Area Committee have allocated around £5,000 to Iwade Church vard to address several defects. M. Baldock agreed to forward a copy of the minutes from Western Area committee to the Iwade Clerk which details the works required.

h. The next Western Area Committee meeting is Tuesday 22 March, a speaker will attend the meeting from Age UK to speak about loneliness which has been highlighted since the pandemic.

v. 01/03/22 – School Lane – Dog stolen from owner's land. Crime report was taken and is being investigated. vi. 04/03/22 – School Lane/School

Mews - reports of males causing ASB which lead to them fighting with a member of the public. Crime report is being investigated.

vii. 05/03/22 - School Mews -Shoplifting from shop. Male was identified by Police. Crime reported and is being investigated.

B. ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR AND OTHER INCIDENTS OF NOTE:

i. 04/02/22 – Holly Blue Drive - ASB, youths were kicking in front door. Youths were stopped by Police taken home and parents were spoken with.

ii. 05/02/22 Ridham Dock – Multiple reports of ASB involving cars being driven at speed along the Dock Road and A249. Due to these, special operations were run. Several drivers have been stopped and spoken to. Tickets were issued where appropriate. iii. 06/02/22, 09/02/22, 26/02/22, 02/03/22 - Sheppey Way - Reports of male causing damage and appearance of caravan on land. The male was spoken to and claimed he owns the land. This was challenged and no proof was provided, however male refused to leave. He was later advised to leave by Police which he did. I then spoke with the male who was still claiming to own the land. I requested proof of this which the male failed to provide. After speaking with the actual landowner advice was given for her to start legal proceedings against the male and to try and obtain a court order to keep it off the land.

Advice was also given that the caravan (Square) – ASB/shoplifting/public order could be removed by the landowner or someone acting on their behalf as long as no damage was caused. This then happened, and the Caravan

was removed. I was present for this process.

I have since been led to believe the male has since returned. Unfortunately, this is still very much a civil issue, and the landowner needs to take the lead in dealing with the removal of this male legally and permanently.

iv. 11/02/22 – Raspberry Hill Lane – Fly tipping. Witness saw a truck pull up and dump skip load at the side of the road.

v. 13/02/22 – Old Ferry Road – Poaching. Person was seen Hare

Coursing. Officers attended and the suspects were spoken to.

vi. 22/02/22 – Woodpecker Drive Park – reports of a suspicious male seen in the area. Male was gone before police arrived.
