
# **IWADE INSPIRATION: TROLLS, DRAGONS AND HOBBITS**

# **PASTORAL LETTER**

Dear Friends.

As I write, the sun is shining, the birds are singing, and the air is full of the sounds of lawn mowers, strimmers, and power tools as people get out into the garden and start to get things ready for the coming warmer months.



Our gardens can be a real source of joy: a space where we can enjoy the fresh air, get our hands dirty and relax. There is masses of research and anecdotal evidence which supports what we probably all know gardening, and being outside, are good for us. Gardening can increase our levels of physical activity, which is beneficial, and time in a green environment has been shown to reduce stress and improve wellbeing. Many of us are fortunate enough to have that outside space, living as we do in villages, or we have places nearby where we can enjoy the glories of creation.

A well-cared for garden, filled with plants, can be such a source of joy. Flowering plants bring colour and beauty, and growing vegetables and fruit can be hugely satisfying. But I believe we need to garden in harmony with nature, not in opposition to it. I was really disturbed when I was at one of our local supermarkets the other day to see just one small shelf dedicated to products for those seeking to garden with respect for nature, while there were five shelves of packets and bottles containing substances

promising to kill ants, slugs, snails, Do we really need to douse our gardens with what are, essentially, poisons? Why are we so obsessed with control and neatness?

There are many ways we can garden in harmony with nature, from planting for pollinators – the most obvious being honey bees, but there are many other insects which pollinate - to providing plants with seed heads for birds, water features which encourage all kinds of wildlife and companion planting, which establishes groups of plants that are beneficial to each other. A lovely example of this is planting nasturtiums near brassicas - cabbage white butterflies will lay their eggs on the nasturtiums, rather than on your precious veg. And fennel attracts hoverflies, which prey on aphids. Garden to encourage hedgehogs – they love to feast on slugs and snails!

God created this beautiful planet of ours, and it is

possible for us to co-exist with all weeds, moss, and all manner of things. manner of creatures, and weeds, rather than simply controlling and destroying things that seem to us to be out of place. And if we spend less time wrestling with nature, maybe we can have a little more time to just 'be' in the natural world and appreciate its variety and complexity.


