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
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



We are open every Tuesday 9-11 term time only. Sessions are £2.50, siblings £1.00, any other children £2.50 each. No need to book.




### MEN'S BREAKFAST CLUB

## **IWADE'S NAUGHTY VICAR!!**

Last month a gentleman came to All Saints' Church enquiring whether we held record of the grave of a Richard Willis in the churchyard. I replied that there was a record of the burial of Willis but no marked grave remained. The visitor explained his interest in the unusual history of Willis and encouraged me to explore further.

Richard Child Willis was born in Petworth, Sussex in 1799. He was the son of Admiral Richard Willis of whom it was said 'he was not of much use to the navy' and his wife, Ann Child. More significantly he was the grandson of Dr. Francis Willis who was the leading physician successfully treating the madness of King George III. From this Dr. Francis achieved fame and a £1000 fee. (He also treated, unsuccessfully, the Queen of Portugal for which he earned £60,000)!

Richard Willis, more properly the Rev. Dr. Richard Child Willis, graduated from Cambridge in 1822 and achieved his doctorate in 1841. He was appointed to various parishes and finally became rector of Warden in 1845, vicar of Minster in Sheppey in 1847 and Chaplain to the Sheppey workhouse in 1849. He had inherited a manor in Yorkshire in what was later to become the town of Ravenscar. His manor house was Raven Hall (now a successful hotel). The town of Ravenscar was planned to become a rival to Blackpool and Scarborough as a holiday resort, but it became known as 'the Town That Never Was'. The planned town received a railway line and station, but on such a steep slope that trains struggled to climb to the top. Its high location meant it was continually buffeted by winds. Its clifftop elevation, some 600 feet above its beach and the fact that the 'beach' was of rocks rather than sand, made it less than ideal as a holiday destination. In the end few houses were ever built and nowadays it serves as a destination only for determined hikers who are still able to see remains of the station platform and the abandoned railway. Richard Willis soon gambled away his estate of some £30,000 due to his addiction to horse racing and 'louse racing'. (Betting on the movement of lice was a popular way of gambling for soldiers at the time!).

He was declared bankrupt but continued to seek the high life. In 1843 he lived for 7 weeks at a London hotel under the name of Captain with a female whom he left there to pay the cost. Willis was clearly a charmer. Over the next few years he paid other hotel bills with large cheques asking the hotels to advance the balance in cash. Hotels, trusting him as a respectable, elderly cleric, did so freely. The cheques were all fraudulent and drawn on banks where he had no account. He was eventually arrested for this and tried for 12 sample frauds at the Central criminal courts in April 1850. A spirited defence by his lawyer claimed that the prosecution had neglected to produce any documentary evidence to prove their case. The judge, having none of this, had advised that he was liable to penalty of 7 years transportation, but handed down a sentence of 1 year's hard labour in Clerkenwell prison.

By 1861 the census reveals that Willis was living in Minster with a wife, Hester, an adopted son and a servant. He was now 67 and Hester was 27. There was a suggestion that though living as husband and wife, Hester was in fact his daughter-in-law. This remains unproven. Hester was never-the-less not his wife, as he had neglected to divorce his previous wife, Frances, who was still alive and living in Sussex. At his death in 1877 he left all his assets. which amounted to no more than £100, to Hester. She subsequently became a matron/proprietor of children's homes.

The only saving grace in this story was that, as Vicar of Minster, he became well known for his brilliant sermons which attracted a large following from all over Sheppey. He died, aged 78, in Sheerness and the large procession from there to his funeral in Iwade included many notable worthies of the district. Church bells were rung in Sheerness and Iwade and all the intervening parishes. It is said that all the inhabitants of Iwade, about 230 at the time, lined the street in respect. He was buried in All Saints Churchyard in February 1877 following a service led by the vicar of Sheerness.

Iwade may not have produced many famous men but at least we may claim one who was infamous.

## **Welcome and Apologies**

The Vice-Chair chaired the meeting, formally welcomed everyone and declared a Minute's Silence would be held at the start as a mark of respect for the late Queen. Following the Silence, apologies were received and accepted from Parish Cllrs. Dollimore, Langham, Cheeseman and Whiting.

## **Minutes of the Previous Meeting**

Proposed by Cllr. Lancashire and seconded by Cllr. Stalley-Moores, the minutes of the Monthly Parish Council meeting held 10 August 2022, were agreed and signed by the Vice-Chair as a true record.

### **Visitors/Public Time**

**1. Visitors -** A resident attended to further outline his concerns over the state of the VILLAGE CENTRE. he had been in contact with the Clerk, who in turn had been pushing the management company to clean up the area, both the centre and the car park, and to undertake urgent work to the crumbling walls, particularly around the stairs and ramp to adjacent to the Pharmacy. He was concerned that three months on, nothing has been done. The Vice-Chair advised that the Council has discussed this matter and does share the residents' concerns, he added that there should be pressure from residents too.

Residents attended to express concern that the Parish Council proposed to spend more money on FENCING AT TELLY TUBBY HILL. The Vice-Chair advised that the fencing was to stop children going up and

down Telly Tubby Hill on bikes at what is a suspending progressing Regulation 19 of very busy junction. It was also to stop children climbing on the Christmas Tree, something that occurred at the 2021 Event, when parents stood and watched their children doing this and were not happy when asked to stop this. Residents were happy with temporary fencing being erected when the Christmas tree was in situ.

As numerous residents attended to discuss this matter, the Vice-Chair brought forward item 7.8 - PARKING ISSUES, - 20 mph scheme SHEERSTONE:

Residents have approached Cllr. Mike Baldock with a proposal for a vehicular access to extend the close further to end of numbers 50 and 48 Sheerstone. Parking has become a severe issue for residents in this area and the surrounds, with many struggling to park their car. Granting vehicular access will allow those seconded by Cllr. D. Waters: Parish who wish, to install a driveway to the front of their property, which will alleviate the parking issue. To protect the Public Right of Way, a single lane will be created for residents to drive along, with pavement installed on both sides. Double yellow lines will be used to ensure the safety of pedestrians. Cllr. Baldock felt this proposal would be beneficial, as well as potentially taking 8/10 cars off the road. He also agreed that ownership of the land needs to be ascertained.
