We also arranged our Christmas lunch, which will be at the Woolpack on Tuesday 12th December. We will meet at the barn at 12.00 and go over to the pub for


12.30. Please look at pub menu so that we can let before that date. There will be a Secret Santa and a gift of up to £10 was agreed.

REMEMBER, REMEMBER, THE FIFTH OF NOVEMBER ..

... and if you don't want to merely recall 'Gunpowder, Treason and Plot', you might also want to remember the 11th November 1918 as well when the Armistice was signed and the world took a collective deep breath and said "no more war". A short-lived hope as it turned out soon after, with scores more wars not least a second World War. Even now, at the time of writing, soldiers and terrorists are engaged in war and, as always, the innocent are paying the price in deprivation and death. There's a lot to remember in November!

I wonder if, in your remembering, you've ever considered how much stones have to play in the process of recollection? From earliest times we've used stones to help us recall particular events and certain experiences that should never be forgotten. Cenotaphs and grave stones, memorials and inscribed plaques; even precious stones set in jewellery to remind us of the love of friends and family. Large and small, rough and smooth, natural and carved; these items dug from the earth can be found everywhere. I have a box of stones in my library recalling special events in my life that I need to remember and currently in our fireplace there sits a rock from the Mendenhall Glacier in Alaska to remind Kim and me of a special holiday experience.

During this month's **Assembly on Sunday** (3.00 in Iwade School Hall on 12th November) we will be using rocks to help us remember. There are all kinds of ways we can do this from painting patterns on the surface to just putting them in a special place in our homes as a souvenir (Remembrance) to help us reflect and learn. One useful thing I try from time to time is simply to hold a stone in my hand and squeeze it. If I squeeze really hard and especially if the stone in question is rough and sharp, then it starts to hurt. The resultant pain can help me reflect on my own wrongdoing and the need for change. As I then look at my empty hand I briefly see the marks of the stone as my skin "remembers" that painful grip. I think of Someone else who has marks in His hands and who emerged from behind a great stone to remind us of new beginnings.

Remembering Stones shouldn't just encourage recollection. In the face of the memory of war, both past and present, they should also help us all to learn ... and to change ... and to start again.

QUARTERLY UPDATE FROM IWADE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council has had an extremely busy year this year been involved on a regular basis dealing with the owners newsletter and on line it has been felt that an update on key areas and projects (both good and bad!) would be of use for the residents of Iwade to refer to easily. It has been decided to try and provide a quarterly update on what has been happening and aim to try and keep residents more informed.

The Parish Council meets on a monthly basis (second Wednesday of each month) at the Village Hall at 7.30pm and residents are always welcome to attend. Key information and updates:

High definition CCTV has been installed in a number of locations around the village which the police have direct

access to - this initiative has taken a considerable time to research and be completed but has already been put to great use in preventing crime and anti-social behaviour. Please do still call 101 or 999 in an emergency as usual.

The Parish Council took part in the Queen's Green Canopy Tree

initiative and a Cherry tree was planted in the Woodpecker Play Area - this has been added to the National Register.

The Pond clearing initiative has been started and the outfalls/headwalls for the pond in Woodpecker Park have been cleared. The next phase will be to start on the pond itself.

A Plaque for the beacon (located in Woodpecker Park) was finally attached to acknowledge the historic date of the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee. It is planned for the beacon to be used again next year as part of the D day commemorations. The Parish Council are in constant communication with

After discussions with KCC the Parish Council have been able to have a number of the lampposts fully repainted that are located on Ferry Road. Not all lampposts could be done with the funding available. A number of the lampposts are still in urgent need of painting and the Parish Council are looking at options.

The Council are busy planning for the turning on of the Christmas lights in Iwade which has become a major activity on the Iwade calendar. There is a large amount of paperwork to still be completed (as expected) but we are hoping the event will be another hugely enjoyable evening for all the residents of Iwade.

The residents and businesses in the Village centre had been having no response to having the severely damaged walls replaced and major litter problems. The Council have

and although the minutes are always available in the village and Management company and we are pleased to see the work has been completed and we are now working actively to reduce the amount of litter found around the vey busy centre.

> The Highway Improvement Plan (HIP) has enabled the Parish Council to have Double Yellow Lines added in a number of places around the village after negotiations and applications with KCC with reference to the Highway Improvement Plan. The HIP is a continually reviewed plan by the Parish Council.

New location signage (Wooden finger-post signage) has been installed at the bottom of School Lane and on the land by the flagpole.

> After many complaints about mobile phone reception in the village the Parish Council undertook with the help of a number of providers a 'reception review'. All providers were contacted to see if they would engage in discussions with a view of improving reception. As a result,

we were pleased that H3G (better known as Three) spoke with us and we are hopeful to see a major investment in the village from them with respect to phone reception in the future. We will of course keep residents informed.

The Parish Council have begun to compile a list of 'target areas' that have been brought to the

Council's attention. The aim is to try and work on these areas where possible and do what we can and when we can to 'look after' the village as much as possible.

Southern Water with reference to the water leaks in the village. It has been extremely frustrating and annoying for all the residents in the village. On site meetings have been made on a number of occasions and as of today the leak has still not been located. This situation is far from acceptable and we have requested support from our Borough Councillors and other Swale officials to bring this situation to a conclusion as soon as possible.

As you can see a great deal has been going on and we will aim to keep you updated. Remember you are always welcome to any of the meetings to have your say and help us make the village a better place for everyone to enjoy. Help us look after Iwade!



Dear Friends,

November means different things to different people. Children will be excited about the fireworks on November the 5th. The artwork and build up to this at school. They will be getting more excited in December, and the run up towards Christmas day.

For others it will be dark and cold. A time to snuggle into duvets and wrap up in warm clothing. Some may find the lack of light a challenge to their day. Trying to pack the working day into less and less daylight. Others may find the lack of light clinically depressing. The fireworks that are so beautiful for many, are a curse to the pet owner and their pets. For those working from home they will see the heating bills going up.

1. Visitors

a. A resident enquired about past planning application; <u>22/505777/FULL</u>: Section 73 - Application for removal of condition 21 (Dwellings approved shall be provided for and occupied by persons of 55 years of age or over) pursuant to 19/505215/ chalet bungalows, which will provide age-restricted general market accommodation for those over the age of 55, together with 21 communal car park spaces and amenity space. The Parish Clerk will forward information about how to comment on this application.

b. A resident advised they would like to discuss the litter issue in the village agenda, item 7.1.

2. County and Borough Councillors

County Cllr. M. Baldock advised the following:
