Iwade Herons *Sunday, 21 February 2010*

On a boggy pitch at Snodland Iwade Herons met the Snodland Nomads. The Iwade lads took the game from the off and a corner from the left was met by Frankie Crimes who thundered a shot past the Snodland keeper into the top right hand corner on 5 minutes to put them 1 up. Both teams pressed hard creating a string of corners and free kicks but the keepers stood firm. On 20 minutes Iwade failed to clear an attack and Snodland forward tapped in from close range which should have been cleared to make it 1 all. With just seconds before half time to go a cross from the left was met perfectly by a Snodland forward who volleyed his shot into the corner for the goal of the game to put Snodland 2 1 up from the

break. Being a one off cup game Iwade's lads pushed hard from the off for an equaliser but were caught out on 10 minutes when a through ball from the back fell to a Snodland forward, he ran on to goal and rounded the Iwade keeper to put Snodland 3 1 up and effectively end the game. Substitutes were put on, the weather got worse but the Iwade lads kept at it against a team at the top of the league. It could have been worse on 20 minutes when Jimmy Neutron, Iwade's left back, sliced a clearance and it smashed against his own crossbar and out for a corner. With Iwade pushing players up for a goal they were caught in possession and Snodland's left winger raced onto goal and slotted past Chris

Hogg, Iwade's keeper to put them further ahead. Snodland then upped a gear and Chris Hogg pulled off a number of excellent saves. One save on 25 minutes was top drawer from the Snodland right winger who smacked one from 25 yards, it was headed for the top corner but Chris Hogg threw himself across goal and tipped round the post for the save of the game. With the game lost and seconds to go Iwade won a corner and all the Iwade players came up to try and score but the ball was cleared and again a Snodland forward ran clear to end the game 5 1 to Snodland. The Iwade managers player went to keeper Chris Hogg and the Iwade parents player went to defender Brandon Glenn.

Freddy Fit comes to Iwade Primary School

In March Freddy Fit's Move it Workshop came to Iwade School. The move it workshops improve PE time by half an hour per week. Things have been getting busier for us as spring gets closer. We have just finished working on the Fire Safety badge which culminated in a trip to our Campsite at Bexon Lane to allow the scouts to get some experience using fire extinguishers. Our trip to the pantomime at Brick Lane Music Hall in February was excellent. The coach was a bit snug for real women but it didn't get in the way of a good day out. We had to have a quick turn around when we got home to be in time for our monthly meeting that evening in the village hall. The WI has a wide range of interests and likes to keep as up to date as possible on important issues. At our February meeting we welcomed Solicitor Daniel Bennett who came to tell us about Collaborative Family Law which is fundamentally changing the way people think about family law. Traditionally, when couples split, they have each taken independent advice from specialist family lawyers then tried to reach agreement on how best to settle their differences, working out how to share their assets and responsibilities for the children. If the agreement can't be reached it's often been left to family courts to decide, leading

to uncertainty and more heartache. Daniel explained that for couples who genuinely seek a fair solution, and want to minimise the pain of family breakdown, collaborative family law may offer the best way ahead. Rather than dealing through solicitors, the couple works with them, to reach the best solutions for them and their family. The idea, simplified, is that the couple sits down together in the same room and, with the help of their solicitors, work everything out face to face. Collaborative lawyers are now practising in many parts of the UK. To find out more you can visit

www.collabfamilylaw.org.uk. The talk at our meeting on 17 March was to have been on Sweets and Chocolates but, unfortunately, the speaker was unable to join us. Speedway's 40th Birthday By Paul Heller

Whilst we are not regular contributors to the village newsletter we thought residents might be interested in knowing that Sittingbourne Speedway is 40 years old this year and is still going strong. The track is still located at The Old Gun Site, Raspberry Hill Lane just outside Iwade Village where it was originally built in the early 1970s and now consists of the main track and a mini track which is used to encourage youngsters to learn to ride a motorcycle in a controlled environment. Over the years it has been the hotbed for budding riders to take up speedway, some of them going on to reach the pinnacle of their careers by becoming England

Internationals representing their country on many occasions. The track was also responsible for producing two world champions and was the birth place of SKY – SPORTS taking up the sport and running the popular televised speedway meetings during the year from April to October. The track was originally known as Iwade Speedway up to the late 1990s when it changed its name to Sittingbourne Speedway Club but to a lot of older speedway followers throughout the country the track will always be known as Iwade. We are very proud of our Iwade heritage and hope we have, in our own small way, helped put the name of Iwade on the map. The Club



hopes to celebrate its birthday with a number of events on and off the track including some special meetings and reunions of past and present riders and guests. A special invitation and a warm welcome is extended to any Iwade residents who may wish to come along. History of All Saint's Church Part 2 By James Hunt

Last month I mentioned a brief history about the church building of All Saints but how about the parish that it serves? In 1798 Iwade or Wade, as it was also known as was mentioned in the History and Topographical Survey of the County of Kent. It describes the parish as being within the ECCLESIASTICAL JURISDICTION of the diocese of Canterbury, and denary of Sittingbourne. The church, which is dedicated to All Saints, is described as a small neat building, consists of two isles and two chancels, having a low pointed steeple, in which are two bells. There is some good painted glass in the windows of it. It was formerly esteemed as a chapel to the church of Tenham, and as such, was given and appropriated with it to the archdeaconry of Canterbury, by Archbishop Stephen Langton, in 1227. George Hall, archdeacon of Canterbury, in his lease of this parsonage granted in 1560,

reserved the sum of eight pounds per annum, to be paid by the lessee as an augmentation to this curacy. The abbot and convent of St. Augustine was possessed of the portion of tithes of Coles land, in this parish, which Thomas, curate of this parish, released all his right to, before Selfrid, bishop of Chichester, in the year 1202, anno 4 of king John. In 1798 it was a perpetual curacy, and was of the yearly certified value of eight pounds. In 1730 it was augmented by lot, by the governors of Queen Anne's bounty, with two hundred pounds, and again by them in 1766 with the like sum. It was afterwards augmented with two hundred pounds more, on a distribution of the like sum from Mrs. Ursula Taylor's legacy, paid to them by Sir Philip Boteler, bart. which, with two hundred pounds since added, was laid out by the then present Incumbent in the freehold

purchase, in the parish of Borden, about three miles from Iwade, the annual rent of which was twenty eight pounds.

Sponsor a roundabout

Cllr. Robb advised that she had a meeting with a representative from 'Swale in Bloom' and it looks as though this project is possible. Kemsley Mill has agreed in principle and she will endeavour to talk to Morrisons.

Community Warden

The Chairman advised Councillors that Julia Warner had resigned. Members were saddened by this news as she had been very proactive in the village. Clerk has written to K.C.C., commending her and asking for the Parish Council's thanks to be passed on to Julia for all her hard work during her short stay with Iwade.

PCSO Melanie Platt

Advised that the next meeting of PACT will be on the 10th February, at 7.00 p.m., in Iwade Village Hall.

Finance

It was proposed by Cllr. Manning and seconded by Cllr. Gregory that the Precept for 2010/11 remain as it was for 2009/10 – agreed by all Members. It was proposed by Cllr. D. White that £10,000 be transferred from the Current Account to the Deposit Account, to go towards replacing the missing money (fraud case) earmarked for the bus shelter – agreed by all Members.

Clerk ordering new chains for the older children's swings.

Broadband

The Broadband Committee has narrowed the list of companies down to two - VFast and Openreach; both offer a good solution to the Broadband problem within the village. The Committee have placed a link on the village website, for villagers to have the opportunity to vote on the company of their choice, based on what is offered by each. This information will then be placed before the Broadband Committee at its meeting on Monday 25th January, 2010, when a final decision will be made. The outcome will then be taken to the Parish Council meeting on the 9th February, for ratification.

Rising crime

Members again raised their concern about rising crime in the village. PCSO Platt mentioned smart water, which can be purchased from the Police but costs about £45 for a small bottle. She is talking to Neighbourhood Watch about carrying out a campaign in the area.

Highway conditions

Following the appalling weather conditions this month and the non clearance of snow from our roads and footpaths it has become apparent that there is a need for more grit bins in the village. K.C.C. has a new assessment procedure for allocating these bins (they are not taking any more requests for the current year, which ends on the 31st March). Clerk to investigate further.

Parish/Town Council

Consultation regarding Electoral Arrangements - The proposed change from 'elections by thirds' to 'whole council elections' was agreed in principle by Members.

Planning

SW/09/0755 – provision of temporary haul road (3 years) whilst land to the west of Woodpecker Drive/Helen Thompson Close is developed – this application was approved at Swale Borough Council's Planning Meeting held on the 11th January. The request by the Parish Council for the haul road to become the permanent access to this site was refused.

SW/09/0756 – Erection of 98 dwellings – Land East of Woodpecker Drive and Helen Thompson Close Iwade – this application was approved at Swale Borough Council's Planning Meeting held on the 11th January, with specific conditions relating to the Great Crested Newt habitat and the play trail.

SW/08/1127 – development land adjacent Coleshall Farm, Sheppey Way, Iwade – this application was approved at Swale Borough Council's Planning Meeting held on the 11th January, 2010.

A letter has been received from Swale's Major Projects Officer in connection with the Coleshall Farm development and maintenance of the recreation ground in School Lane. Clerk instructed to invite the Planning officer to the next Parish Council meeting to discuss this issue.

Next meeting will be held at 7.30pm in Iwade Village Hall on the 13th April
